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



What Can Be Done?

Addressing inclusivity challenges requires collaborative efforts from different stakeholders (educational institutions, governments, and other organizations) to create more accessible and holistic pathways programs for Indonesian students to expand their access in pursuing international education opportunities.









INDIA

International Education for the many

INDIA

- World's most populous nation
- 40% of its 1.4 billion population under 25
- World's 5th largest economy; 2nd largest higher education system
- 38 mn students in 50,000 academic institutions (1,057 universities)
- Second largest source of international students globally





Equity and Inclusion

- In 2022, 1.2mn Indian students went abroad to study, spending \$50 bn.
- By 2025, predicted over 2mn Indian students, will spend \$70 bn.
- 99% of Indian students unlikely to travel abroad for higher education.
- Why should we deprive them of the benefits of internationalization?





National Education Policy

• India's <u>National Education Policy (NEP)</u> 2020 aims to significantly improve its higher education system with an emphasis, for the first time, on <u>internationalization</u>.

 Aiming to open up a highly regulated and a largely closed academic system to the world, the NEP prescribes reforms to address challenges of <u>capacity</u>, <u>equity</u>, <u>access to resources</u>, <u>quality</u>, <u>and</u> <u>bureaucratic obstacles</u>.





Internationalization at Home

 <u>Internationalization at Home'</u> popularised by Jos Beelen and Elspeth Jones says: "Internationalisation at Home is the purposeful integration of international and intercultural dimensions into the formal and informal curriculum for all students, within domestic learning environments."

• 'Domestic learning environments' ('at Home') include home campus, home city (of diverse socio-cultural life), and intra-cultural spaces, which provide international learning opportunities within the nation.





Access: Skilling, Reskilling, Upskilling

• According to the World Economic Forum's <u>The Future of Jobs Report</u> <u>2023</u>, there will be a 44% disruption of skills in the next five years.

• The <u>Skill India Mission</u> focuses on skilling, re-skilling and upskilling through short-term and long-term training programmes. The Indian government is implementing various skill development schemes.

What is COIL?



COIL is Collaborative Online International Learning

COIL uses technology and the Internet to bring diverse faculty and students together--across borders of time, space, language, culture, and discipline--to engage in peer-to-peer intercultural dialogue and meaningful projects. Since COIL is embedded within the curriculum, participating students gain access to the world and its diversity without incurring any additional cost.

COIL's project-based focus increases participant motivation to pursue more global learning opportunities: travel, study, research, service, and internships abroad.




