BloodSafe eLearning Australia

BloodSafe eLearning Australia (BEA) is a national program providing free online education to health professionals involved in blood transfusions and patient blood management, to improve safety and quality. BEA is accessed by 1536 Australian hospitals and healthcare organisations for professional development and mandatory training. Over 772,000 learners, made up of nurses/midwives (87%), doctors (8%), and other health care professionals (5%), have completed over 1.8 million BEA courses, thereby enhancing their knowledge and skills in blood transfusion safety.



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Professor David Roxby - Flinders University / Australian Red Cross Lifeblood / SA Pathology, SA

David is a Professor in the College of Medicine and Public Health, Flinders University, Medical Scientist at Australian Red Cross Lifeblood and Emeritus Senior Medical Scientist at SA Pathology where previously he was Head of the SA Pathology Transfusion Service in South Australia for many years.

He was a member of ANZSBT Council and has participated in numerous national and government committees. He is very active as a teacher, supervisor and examiner in science, medicine, nursing and midwifery. Over the years he has received numerous awards and research grants and co-authored more than 50 peer-reviewed scientific papers. His interests include the interface between the laboratory and clinical practice, improvement in transfusion practices, critical bleeding and massive transfusion and the safe and appropriate use of blood and blood products.
